Suggestions for a successful rotation at San Antonio Military Medical Center (SAMMC):

- 1. Wear the correct uniform and wear it well. If you're not sure about proper wear, ASK.
- 2. Keep hair within regulation.
- 3. Be on time! (this means 10 minutes early)
- 4. Be motivated!
- 5. Have a smile on your face.
- 6. Take note of interesting facts to read about later.
- 7. If you use your phone to take notes, make sure it is obvious you're taking notes and not updating your Facebook status or posting a "tweet"!
- 8. DO NOT take photos, videos, recordings or post ANYTHING on social media!
- 9. Volunteer, if you have the time.
- 10. Be professional! Your appearance and behavior does matter.
- 11. Think before you speak.
- 12. Treat EVERYONE with respect.
- 13. Always be truthful, NEVER lie. If you don't know something, or make a mistake admit it.
- 14. Complete every assigned task.
- 15. Be a hard worker. There is always something you can do and someone you can help. Ask!
- 16. Be ethical. Always do the right thing.
- 17. Be a critical thinker. This is essential.
- 18. Be a problem solver.
- 19. Think proactively.
- 20. Form a differential diagnoses.
- 21. Formulate a plan based on your differential.
- 22. Make treatment suggestions.
- 23. Read!
- 24. Read about your rotation before you arrive.
- 25. Read the notes you take each day.
- 26. Ask the senior resident or staff for a topic to read about.
- 27. Be helpful!
- 28. Help the patients get them a cup of water, a blanket...
- 29. Help a medic move a patient, clean the bed...
- 30. Help a nurse with anything they ask! Nurses spend more time with the patients and will know a lot that you do not. Listen to the nurses!
- 31. Help a medical student they are your colleagues and members of your team!
- 32. Be thankful! If you are truly interested in a particular specialty, send a handwritten thank you note after you have completed the rotation.
- 33. And finally, enjoy yourself. SAMMC is a wonderful facility and a great place to be. Have fun, learn, make friends, make a difference!
